

History of Selah Christian Church

Selah is a Disciples of Christ church in the open country of Grantham Township of Wayne County. It is sixteen miles west by southwest from Goldsboro. For several years before the church was officially organized, a few Christians of the community held prayer meetings in their homes and in the old Park Hill schoolhouse.

People had moved into the community who were members of Mill Creek Church in Johnston County and elsewhere. They continued to worship with the church from whence they had come, but that was a great distance to travel in those days. The only means of travel was by horse and buggy, wagon, cart, or on foot.

Haywood and Betsie Bizzell conceived the idea of building a church, and Mrs. Bizzell selected Selah as the name for the church. This term we have inherited from Hebrew psalmody. It was a music mark to denote a period for meditative rest. It was a symbolic call to solemn reflection on the truth immediately preceding. It has good connotation for worship in any age.

Mr. and Mrs. Bizzell were rather old and having no children to help with the work, gave money toward the construction of the building. There was little money for a building of any kind, but those who had money contributed for materials. Others gave logs, which were hauled by mules and log carts to the Eliza Thornton and Jesse Cox sawmill located on the Isaac Thornton farm. Community families hauled the lumber back from the sawmill with mules and wagons. Lightwood trees were donated by Zeke Grantham, John W. Britt, William Wright Weaver, Julius Ivey, and Joel Rose. The trees were sawed with crosscut saws into blocks, which were hewn down with axes and used for pillars of the church. (The pillars remained under the church until 2012 when the sanctuary was remodeled, most of them were still in good shape.) The lumber was dressed by hand, including pews and pulpit furniture.

Prior to the construction of the building, a revival was held in the schoolhouse. Their pastor, Rev. James H. Johnson, preached during the revival. The crowds became so large; they were pressed for room. The schoolhouse was only a small one-room building. The Friends of Bethany Meeting, nearby, let them use their house for the last services. Many names were added to the church roll during this revival meeting.

In the year 1890, Bourbon Ivey and wife, Ava, deeded to Joel L. Rose, William W. Weaver, and E. T. Grantham, trustees, and their successors after them, three acres of land on which Selah Christian Church was built. W. P. (Tobe) Rose constructed the building at a contract price of \$125. By 1892, the initial frame building was completed with a value of \$700. Many families in the community contributed free labor. All lumber was dressed by hand except the ceiling. A small amount of lumber was machine dressed for the ceiling. All lumber used in the church building was select long-leaf heart pine. In the beginning, only the main auditorium was constructed. Later it was plastered. Hog hair was saved from hog killings in the community and used to help stick the plaster to the wood lathes. The first pulpit furniture and benches were built by Julius Ivey and Will Hood (hired carpenters). Some of the original benches are still used in the Sunday School classrooms. The original pulpit is used in the foyer. The first lighting was by kerosene lamps. Later, carbide lights were used. Heat was furnished by a wood stove in the center of the church. Since there were no classrooms, classes assembled in different parts of the auditorium. Later curtains were used to separate classes.

The first officers at Selah were: Elders--Haywood Bizzell, Bourbon Ivey; Deacons--Ezekiel Grantham, William Wright Weaver, James Williams; Church Clerk--Wilson Ivey. Some other charter members were: Mr. and Mrs. Offie Best, Mr. and Mrs. Joel L. Rose, Mrs. Nancy Rose, Mrs. Haywood Bizzell, Mrs. William Wright Weaver, Mrs. Bourbon Ivey, Mrs. Ezekiel Grantham, & Mrs. James Williams. The congregation with 129 members was enrolled in the North Carolina Christian Missionary Convention in 1893.

In the mid 1890's their pastor, James H. Johnson, lived at nearby Dobbersville, (population, 60) and operated one of the three stores there. The post office for most of Selah's members was Bizzell, which had a population of 20, and was one of the 20 post offices in the county at that time. There was but a single store there. It was a confectionary shop run by R. A. Whitfield.

Selah's first Sunday School was started in 1893. Wilson Ivey was the first superintendent and Julius Ivey was secretary. Both got their mail at Bizzell, North Carolina. The membership was 55. Total offering for the year for Sunday School was \$4.93. The church had fruitful summer revivals, making for a steady gain in membership through the years. In 1900 it was 189, and a total of \$69 was given for total expenses that year. In the summer of 1924, two Atlantic Christian College men, W. O. Henderson and L. B. Bennett held their revival and added 22 new members. Mrs. Julius Ivey, local correspondent, reporting this for Selah, added: "We are glad we have a college that can send out such preachers as these."

A charter member, Mrs. Joel L. Rose, passed away on April 14, 1937. Her pastor said of her: "She was indeed a mother in Israel. She reared 12 children: 6 boys and 6 girls. She was most faithful. Her long and useful life is a benediction to the Selah community." Also in 1937 two new Sunday School rooms were added to the building.

Electricity became available and some of the members of Selah wanted electric lights for the church. Electric lights were installed in 1939 although many of the people did not want electricity and therefore would not pay any part of the bill, which was a flat rate of \$1.50 per month, payable annually.

During the time of World War II, the original building needed a new roof. Timber was cut from church property and sold for \$35 per thousand board foot. The timber was used for the war effort and the proceeds from the timber sale were used to replace the old shingle roof with roll tin.

In 1949 the church building was "completely renovated and decorated," and the cemetery much improved in appearance. In 1950 the C. W. F. (Christian Women's Fellowship) which has been very active and the CYF (Christian Youth Fellowship) "showing promise of extensive service" was organized.

Installation of new pews, art glass windows, and a new heating system were effected in 1954. Another Sunday School room was also added adjacent to the auditorium, and the interior was also redecorated. The same year Dr. James Rose and Dr. David Rose donated several gas heaters. In 1959 two rest rooms and a lounge were added.

From this church have gone out three Christian ministers: Victor Hugo Grantham, Glenn Weaver, and Donald Weaver. Glenn held a summer revival in 1954. The pastor, W. C. Foster, testified as follows: "The morale of the church was lifted to the highest point in recent years. The future of the church is very bright." During that summer membership at Selah was 120.

Another minister making his start at Selah Church was Jean L. Hood. He was a member at Selah in his early years. He later moved to the Methodist Church where he became a Methodist minister. Since his retirement, he & his wife, Elizabeth, have come back to Selah.

Selah was vandalized in 1966. Thieves took the gas heaters and consequently central heating was installed. One half acre of land was added to the cemetery in 1967 as a gift from Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Helms. Years later, Robert Grantham, Jr. plotted the cemetery into 150 gravesites and placed cement markers on each plot for his Eagle Scout project. In 1968 additional furniture was added to the building. Thieves struck again in 1971 taking the piano. A new one was secured and dedicated in the sanctuary. It was bolted to the floor. In 1973 the water pump was stolen, and in 1974 the bulletin board outside was damaged by a car wreck. Central air conditioning was installed in 1974. Vandals broke the windows in 1975. Art glass windows were secured to replace the damaged ones. In 1978, Jean and Kim Hollowell donated funds in memory of Ruben Hollowell for cushions for the pews and the chancel chairs.

Talk began about the need for a fellowship hall, so the women initiated the fundraising with a yard sale which netted \$244.50. A dedicated group of women began making quilts to sell at the annual harvest sale and supper, which was resumed after having been discontinued some years earlier. Usually the quilts were the top item at the sale--often bringing \$2,000 to \$3,000. The quilters included Lessie Aswell, Althea Best, Fannie Bell Best, Alice Britt, Mary Lee Carter, Lorena Edwards, Edna Earle Grantham, Viola Grantham, Jean Hollowell, Irma Lambert, Fannie Rose, Betty Rose, Doris Sanderson, Marjorie Tart, & Clara Weaver. The women used to meet at Diane Tart Thornton's home to cut and sew pieces of the quilt together. Although many of these ladies are not with us any more, the quilting continues under the leadership of Linda Petras & Dolores Hood, along with many friends from local churches. Mrs. Fannie Rose started the annual supper & sale again and was in charge for about 15 years. The earlier suppers were held at the Grantham School cafeteria. Betty & J. L. Rose took over the suppers in 1985 and were in charge for about 15 years, then turning the project over to Shirley & Billy Carter, who are still in charge today. Fundraising suppers were served to fertilizer and chemical companies. Church members sold scrap aluminum and peanuts.

After a groundbreaking ceremony in 1981, construction was begun on the Selah Church Fellowship Hall and the building progressed, as funds became available. Pat Grady was the contractor. Tables and chairs were purchased, a heat pump installed, ceiling and floor covering added and cabinets built. The building was dedicated on Homecoming Sunday in October 1985. In November of the same year a benefit dinner was served to raise funds for a church member, Sarah Grantham Johnson, a cancer victim who died a month later. The Fellowship Hall has been used by Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4-H Clubs, wedding receptions, and family reunions as well as church functions.

There have been many hard working, dedicated Christians at Selah throughout the years that are not with us any more: Herbert & Sadie Barnes and their daughter, Rose Barnes Springle, Norman &

Lona Britt, Moses & Alice Britt, Bernard Cox, Robert Grantham, Pennie Holmes, Emma Hood, George & Ruth Ivey, Tilghman Gardner, Ernest & Donnie Sanderson, Joe & Doris Sanderson, Leuria Settlemyer, Gertha & Clara Weaver, Ivan & Margaret Westbrook. Mrs. Lona served as church treasurer, Mr. Norman as Sunday School treasurer; Alice Britt was a quilter and could always tell a funny joke; Bernard Cox was an elder and served as superintendent and did whatever was needed for the church; Ruth Ivey served as pianist and Sunday School teacher and worked with Vacation Bible School; Mrs. Emma Hood taught Sunday School; Mrs. Pennie Holmes had perfect attendance for many years; Mr. Ernest was an elder and Mrs. Donnie taught Sunday School, Bible school, and was Sunday School treasurer until she turned it over to Marjorie Tart who after many years gave the job to her daughter, Dianne Tart Thornton. In later years, the Sunday School and Church money was combined. Robert Grantham was the Building Fund treasurer and an elder; Robert later turned the position of Building Fund treasurer over to Russell Weaver. The Building Fund was later combined with the church treasury. Joe Sanderson served as an elder, superintendent and treasurer of the church until 1998, when Jean Aswell Hollowell became treasurer; Joe was also in charge of the cemetery. He knew more history about the church than anyone else. He was always in charge of the traffic at the suppers. Doris served as Sunday School & Bible school teacher, and held many positions in CWF. Leuria was responsible for air conditioning in the church. She was very good about getting donations for projects. She played the piano, taught Sunday School, and directed Christmas programs and patriotic programs for the church. She also organized trips to Washington, DC for the young people. She thought everyone should see the nation's capital. Gertha & Clara Weaver were very active members--he served as an elder and she taught Sunday School & Bible school. Ivan Westbrook was an excellent Sunday School teacher and did "repair" work for the church after he retired. Vaden Best painted the inside of the church and he and Carl Settlemyer put new flooring in the sanctuary.

In 1986 the wood trim on the church was covered with vinyl siding. An outside building was constructed to use for cooking barbecue and chickens for the annual fundraising supper and harvest sale. Dedicated church members and loyal friends have made all these improvements possible without the need to borrow money.

The Wilbert Stafford farm bell was given to the church in 1990 by his son, Linol. This bell was formerly owned by two generations of Lamberts and was purchased from Sears & Roebuck in 1860.

At the Homecoming service in 1991, Selah celebrated the 100th anniversary at which time Miss Sallie Grantham, the oldest living member was honored. She was born the year the church was organized. Miss Grantham lived to within one week of 103 years old.

Playground equipment was donated by Jim Grantham of Grantham Supply in 1994. A television, VCR, and tapes were purchased for the religious education of the primary classes.

In 1995 thieves took the television, VCR and tapes, which the church replaced in the same year.

Steve Bostic began serving as the church's first full-time minister in June 1995. Prior to this, church was held twice a month by a rotating minister.

Selah's CWF (Christian Women's Fellowship) purchased new choir robes in 1996, which were worn by the choir for the first time in celebration of Homecoming Day in October of 1996. Bibles were purchased to be placed in the pews by Herb Blowers in 1996 in memory of his wife, Betty.

In 1997 a classroom was converted into a baptistery and office. Bookcases were added to the classrooms. The same year a picture of Selah Christian Church was painted and donated by Betty Carolyn Ivey Sutton. It is hanging in the foyer of the new Fellowship Hall for which ground was broken in 2001.

As was the tradition of Selah members caring for their own, in 1994, a love offering of \$500 was given to cancer victim, Edward Carter, a Selah Church member. A supper for his benefit was also held at a later date. As the need arose, contributions have been made to other community people. Selah people believe in helping their local community.

In 1998, a sound system was installed for the sanctuary. Also about \$2,500 was given to people in the community who had lost their homes in the flood or a fire or just had a desperate need for help. The church sponsored a goat project for the youth by buying 13 goats for them to show at the Livestock Show. The CWF purchased new carpet for the sanctuary in 1999.

In 2000, new pews were donated by the following families: Fannie Belle Best; Cathy & Kirby Best; Alice Britt; Mary Lee Carter; Shelly & Edward Carter; Shirley, Billy, & Carolyn Carter; Christel & Billy Denning; Angela & Robert Grantham Jr.; Edna Earle & Robert Grantham Sr.; Jean A. Hollowell; Alice Britt, Leuria Settlemyer, & Mildred Smith; Ruth & George Ivey; Nancy & Sherrill Johnson; Lois & Gilbert Bradshaw; Tina, Scott, & Megan Peele; Olivia, Jack, & Jackie Musick; Betty & J. L. Rose; Bobby & Ann Rose; Doris & Joe Sanderson; Marjorie & John Tart; Anita & Roy Weaver; Faye, Carl, & Russell Weaver.

The original pulpit and a short bench were refinished as part of the redecoration of the church foyer in 2001 by Jean A. Hollowell and Mary & Edward Aswell.

After the foundation was poured for a new Fellowship Hall in 2001, men of the church donated many hours of their time to the construction of the new building with the help of Elton Grady. Church ladies prepared food for the men. Funds collected over the years from church suppers and harvest sales were used for this project. Pledges of money were also collected. Tables & chairs were donated by Pat Grady. No money was ever borrowed. Mary Lee Carter donated the wall paper for the kitchen. Jean A. Hollowell and Mary Aswell donated mirrors for the bathrooms. The building is valued at about \$350,000. The new Fellowship Hall was first used in 2005. Jean A. Hollowell was the first to use the facility for her high school reunion in June of that year.

During the construction years, the original Fellowship Hall was converted into classrooms to accommodate the increase in attendance. A stage was built in the new building, and a digital piano was purchased for the sanctuary with memorial gifts in 2006.

Each year, Selah contributes to the Mill Creek Scholarship for a student interested in the ministry. However, in 2006 a scholarship fund for Selah Church youth pursuing higher education in any field of study was established. New hymnals, two vacuum cleaners, furniture for the new foyer, and chandeliers for the sanctuary were purchased. The church nursery was updated and refurnished, office furniture was purchased, bookcases were added to the classrooms and pictures of the original church and historical documents were framed and hung in the foyer of the new Fellowship Hall. Dolores Hood painted and donated a picture of Selah Church, which shows the new building as it was in 2008. A projector, screen, and DVD player were added to our sound system.

Members of the Christian Men's Fellowship (CMF) designed a playground and installed new playground equipment.

A pictorial church directory showing our church family was completed in 2007. An outstanding live Nativity display of 10 scenes of the life and death of Jesus was viewed by about 900 people on December 21 and 22, 2007. Denny Tart and Cathy Jernigan were the organizers for the production. This has become an annual event. For several years, Selah has also hosted a Community Fun Day in the fall with games, food, and gospel sings.

On February 10, 2008, Decision Sunday was an unforgettable event. Fifty-five new members were added to the church roll. Selah is a growing church with many activities planned. Church membership is now 145, and Sunday School is 156.

A storage building was built in 2009 by Pat Grady. John Tart and Pat Grady donated funds for a digital keyboard for the choir room. The CMF (Christian Men's Fellowship) installed a chain link fence around the cemetery.

The air conditioner units were stolen in 2009 and again in 2010. In 2010, the oil furnace for the sanctuary was replaced by a new heating and air system. The men put frames around the air conditioning units to deter criminals. American Flags were purchased by the CMF to be put on the grounds on special holidays. A projector and screen was installed in the Fellowship Hall.

Kim & Jeff Kennedy and Patrick & Jennifer Muston organized ski trips for the youth for several years. In 2009, the CMF began holding a Sweetheart Banquet honoring the widows and widowers with the whole church being invited.

In 2011 the Bobby Stevens and Eugene Head families paid for gutters to be installed on the back porch. A new ice maker was purchased. Security cameras were installed.

In 2012 the sanctuary was renovated by adding space for 8 additional pews, new stained-glass windows, new carpet, and recovering the old pews. The side room was also refurbished and a side porch added. A larger foyer, pastor's study, bathroom, steeple, and a porch was added to the front of the church. Shingles were replaced on all buildings. Much work was done under the church. The original pillars were removed and a more solid foundation was installed. Pat Grady was the contractor, John Tart the building chairman, and Ed Aswell, the chairman of the board. Ed said, "every time he was chairman,

the church was involved in a building program.” (Pat Grady also built the first fellowship hall. His son, Elton was the contractor for the second fellowship hall. The original star on the front of the church was refurbished by John Grady, Pat’s son. The Grady family has been very important to Selah Church.) Many people in the church donated windows and pews. The cornerstone was donated by Brian Taylor of Seymour Funeral Home and Lynn Taylor of Rouse Funeral Home. A time capsule will be placed behind the cornerstone to be opened in 2062. Additional security cameras were installed on the sides of the church. One of the classrooms was enlarged.

Mr. & Mrs. Horace Hood donated the steeple for the church. Windows were donated by Steve & Annie Fritz, Jean A. Hollowell, Manfred & Dolores Hood, Sue & David Hill, Tony Grady, Peggy Hollowell, Gordon & Lena Joyner, Horace & Edna Hood, Keith & Beverly Westbrook & Jeff & Kim Kennedy, the children of James & Maggie Hood in their honor--Trudy Hinson, Jimmy & Rita Hood, Glenn & Betsy Hood, Darryll & Linda Overton; Edna Earle Grantham & Angie & Robert Grantham, Jr., Charles & Annette Weaver, Shirley & Billy Carter & Brian & Carolyn Anderson, Phil & Fran Hood, J. L. & Betty Rose, the children of Joe & Doris Sanderson in their memory--Kenneth & Vickie Sanderson, Darrel and Marjorie Conley, David Sanderson, and Scott & Beth Peterson. The stained glass window above the front door was donated by Snow & Richard Proctor.

Pews were donated by Tony Grady, Hansford Ricks, Sylvia Taylor, Tom & Jean Frey, Eugene & Linda Head, Donna & Charlie Thomas, Ruth & John Bennett, Viola Grantham, Carolyn & John Perry, David & Kim Bunch, and Pat Grady.

The mirror in the side bathroom was made by Phil Hood from an original window frame in the “old” church.

The CWF paid for the furniture in the new foyer and the pastor’s study.

Hope Rose, Joel Rose, and Nicole Barry were the first people baptized in our newly renovated church on Sunday, August 12, 2012. Joel Rose and Nicole Barry were the first couple to be married in the newly renovated church on August 18, 2012.

A dedication was held on Sunday, September 30, 2012. Rev. John Richardson, our regional minister, delivered the message.

Another Decision Sunday was held on October 7, 2012. One person moved her membership, and several rededicated their lives to Christ.

Selah was selected by the North Carolina Grange as the Church of the Year for 2012. A book depicting what was done that year is on a table in the foyer of the Fellowship Hall.

In 2012 and 2013, Selah served as a Relief Station for the Tuna Run 200 providing facilities, snacks, & drinks for the runners.

On October 13, 2013, Spate, son of Matt & Andrea Sanderson was dedicated. Also in 2013, Mrs, Viola Grantham, a very dedicated church member, who has been a choir member, Sunday School teacher, Vacation Bible School teacher, and treasurer of CWF for 49 years, resigned her position and Fran Hood was elected to take her place. What a life of dedication!

Modern technology has been incorporated into Selah's ministry as we strive to use every means to share God's word and communicate more efficiently. Phil Hood sends pray requests through the internet to Prayer Warriors. Photos of church events, news, & scripture are available on our church website developed by Denny Tart--www.Selahchurch.com.

The statue of Jesus was vandalized and broken in 2013. Both men were caught and put in jail. Money given by the family of Peggy & Carl Hollowell and Ed and Mary Aswell was used to replace the statue and put benches on the front porch and in the cemetery.

For the last 10 years, a man in our community who is not a member at Selah, Daniel Potter, has given \$777.77 each year to the church. He said the Lord told him to give that amount. Many people think he does this because the church does not charge for cemetery plots. Anyone can be buried at Selah without charge as long as there is room.

A new church sign made of granite and stone, given by John and Marjorie Tart, has been installed. The original brick sign was donated by the family of Clarence & Nannie Grantham in the late 50's.

Selah Christian Church has been very fortunate to have Patrick Muston as our pastor for the past 11 years. He and his wife, Jennifer, and their two children, Maddie and Luke, have been a blessing to our church.
